

## “Lailat Hob”

**L**ailat Hob” (pronounced “LAY-let hobe”) is a long song that was made famous by Umm Kulthum, Egypt’s premiere singer (1904?-1975). The form is known as *ughmiyya*, literally “song,” and it usually includes a vocal refrain or some other form of internal repetition, and frequently has one or more instrumental sections, quite distinct from one another and from the sung portions, that we refer to here as “overtures” (preceding the song) or “interludes” (between sung portions of the composition).

The music of “Lailat Hob” was written by Muhammad ṢAbd al-Wahhab, one of Egypt’s greatest singer-composers. (1910?-1991) The portion of music presented here is just the overture to the song, which has many other beautiful instrumental sections as well as vocal melodies.

Maqam-s: *Nahawand nawa* and *Bayyati*.

Iqa’at: Like most other large, complex Arabic pieces, “Lailat Hob” contains several rhythm changes. The *iqa’at* or rhythm patterns used include *baladi*, *malfuf*, six-eight, and *maqsūm*.


